


This is the bread,

**Today's aim is to find out what happened in the days before Easter.**

Luke 22:7-23

Read the Bible story and then look at each of the pictures in turn. Let the children tick the box if that item or person was in the story and leave it blank if not. This activity helps the children become more familiar with this important Easter story. As you look at each item, discuss it a little further, for example: "What did Jesus do with the bread?" (Broke it and gave it to his friends.)

Children of this age can appreciate the awe and solemnity of this Bible story, but the symbolism of the broken bread and poured-out wine is still beyond them. They cannot yet understand how one thing can stand for another, the broken bread for a broken body,

the poured-out wine for the spilt blood. This understanding will come as they grow older. In the meantime, we can support their growth in faith by helping them to realise that this special meal was important – and still is today.



"Share this," he said. "Soon someone in this room will choose not to be my friend any more."


His friends looked at each other, amazed. "Who is it?" they wondered.

# A meal with Jesus



What did Jesus give his friends to eat and drink?

Join the dots to find out.

Look at the picture of Jesus at the table with his friends. Remind the children that it was a special meal. What did he give them to eat and drink? Help them join the dots to reveal the bread and the wine.

If the children are familiar with Holy Communion, talk over the similarities between what they have seen and experienced and the picture of Jesus with his friends. What is eaten and drunk at a Communion service? Who comes to the Communion service? (Friends of Jesus.)
